

We rang touches of Plain Bob Doubles and courses of Norwich Surprise Minor, which I hear the Marston ringers have been practising. I rang my first ever course of Delight, too. Numbers were a little low, though.

A Branch practice is a good opportunity to share tips and to practise something you don't have a strong band for in your own tower, so I hope you'll take advantage of it.

There won't be a branch practice in April, because of Ed Nicholson's Nottingham outing, which is now on the 22<sup>nd</sup> April, and because we haven't been able to get a venue for a ringing up-and-down practice yet. Next month it's the Striking Competition with the Stallpits mini ring, the AGM and a practice at St Thomas's. The Striking Competition will be on 6 bells but there'll be 10-bell ringing later, where I hope to ring everything from rounds upwards. And if that's not temptation enough, I think I've volunteered to bake a cake!

## A Practice at Chalgrove (6) 16cwt, on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> March

The yellow blossom of daffodil and tender green shoots on the trees accompanied us to Chalgrove. On the way to the church tower, Judy Kirby



kindly drove us to see John Hampden's Monument, a memorial for the English Civil War politician and 'patriot. We were welcomed by the Vicar and Brian Gray, the

Tower Captain, to the elegant historic church, where we had time to appreciate the rediscovered wall paintings. As usual, we learned a lot from Susan King, the antiquarian, about English architecture and tradition. This included a small hidden window which would allow people who had to stand outside the church, because of their illness, to see what was going on at the altar. Susan explained the relationship between the three figures cast in the floor of the chancel, and even their status and profession, and directed our attention to the exquisite historical font. Also, thanks to Susan, I have learned what a ting tang bell is for! The bright and pleasant new ringing chamber was a delightful place in which to pull the ropes. I took the opportunity to try the tenor, which was much heavier than the one in St Nicholas, Marston - actually 2 1/2 times as heavy. Soon, we were joined by Steve Vickars from Kirtlington. I might have been the one who benefited most from this session, as we rang a lot of Reverse Canterbury, thanks to Steve's conducting. We did plenty of Doubles, ranging from dear old Plain Bob Doubles to the inspiring and much admired Stedman. **Kathy Xu**

## David Park's Trip to Wiltshire on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> March


Swindon may well be a paean to post Industrial zeal and distention, and indeed we passed through one of the famous urban landmarks on the way to our final tower of Christchurch, namely the myriad that is the Magic Roundabout, yet it is nonetheless still engirded by an irrefutable quintessence of irurrality. On this occasion we were on the eastern and southern flanks of the town where one is never more than ten minutes' drive between idyllically situated churches that possess bells. The idiom 'like chalk and cheese' is said to have derived from this area due to distinct juxtaposition of the chalky uplands and low lying dairy land.



We started our day at **Bishopstone (8)**, with its church set amidst a glade surrounded by a network of brooks and small streams. Our second stop was **Wanborough (8)**, with its spectacular church that has a tower at one end and a spire at the other, highly reminiscent of Purton, on the other side of Swindon, which we visited a couple of years ago. For our third tower we were privileged to be the first visiting band to ring on the brand new set of bells at **Liddington (6)**. Readers of the Ringing World would have seen a front page story this February regarding this restoration project which saw the original set of five bells and frame retained with a new set of six cast and installed below.



After lunch we rang at **Chiseldon (6)** which kept up the standard of excellent sets of bells that we had encountered to this point. So to our final tower and no slackening in the quality of bells as **Christchurch, Swindon (10)**, proved to be a sublime ring of ten that had everyone, without exception, singing their praises.
