The Ringing Master's Report

Spring is in the air! It was still decidedly wintry on 10th February though, so thank you to everyone who came to the branch practice in Kidlington.



I try to suit the practice to the ringers so please let me know what you want to ring. At Kidlington we had Stedman Triples with singles and Plain Bob Triples, amongst other things.

After the ringing, we held a brief business meeting. We approved the accounts and elected Craig Robertson, Namiko Minai and Fukiné Minai as members.

There has apparently been a recent stirring of interest in handbell ringing in the branch. John Pusey and Steve Everett have been teaching the St Giles learners to ring rounds and plain hunting, and Steve ran a session at St Andrew's too. Ringing handbells is a good way for learners to get started on change ringing without having to be confident at bellhandling yet; there's a more direct connection between the ringer's motion and the sound of the bells, and less physical skill required. Once you get to method ringing it's good for seeing more of what's going on in the method, too. Rather than trying to ring two bells independently (I don't know about you, but I don't have the brainpower for that!), you learn the bells as a pair. This means you get the hang of noticing where you pass the treble, or watching course bells (the bells that reach the back one after another).

If you want to try it, you're welcome to join John and Steve at St Giles' 6:30pm practice on Thursdays. If you can already ring plain courses of Plain Bob Minor and are ready to ring more, want to go a bit further, you could join them on Mondays from 6pm, so do get in touch.

To date, there have been 11 ladies quarter peals rung in the Guild. Alison has rung in 10 of these and conducted 7 of them – well done on an excellent job Alison. I have rung in four of them – all were very enjoyable, but there are two which deserve a special mention as they were first quarter peals for two city branch ringers – Brenda Gratwicke and Nora Tarczy Novak both from Kidlington. Huge congratulations to both of them. They both rang really well, and I hope they will be the first of many.

A Trip to the Berkshire Downs

Twelve lucky ringers had a great time on the fortuitous first ringing outing of 2018, visiting Kintbury (8), Great Shefford (6) and Lambourn (8) on



Monday 12th February. I was particularly excited about this outing because Hugh had unwittingly arranged the outing in the new parish of North Leigh's previous House for Duty Priest Miri Keen, on the very day that she was to be collated, inducted and installed as Rector in her new group of 8 parishes!

As the service in the evening was at Brightwalton, the local ringers were very happy for us to visit Great Shefford and ring Miri's new bells in celebration of her special day, just across the road from her new Rectory. Before arriving at Great Shefford, our day got off to a balmy start at Kintbury

when John and Steve indulged me in ringing handbells in the glorious sunshine, surrounded by snowdrops in the churchyard. I don't think we really managed to do justice to the 8 tower bells of



Kintbury (although I'm happy to report we did a lot better than I did on the handbells!). The close proximity of tenor and treble plus the huge gap between treble and two kept us on our toes and messed with our heads; maybe it was the influence of the Kintbury Witch, who is said to have prevented the locals from retrieving the Kintbury Great Bell when it fell into the river during a great storm in the 15th century. The delightful six old bells at Great Shefford, rehung anticlockwise in their round tower in 2012, were an entertaining sequel to this confusion. The treble, tucked away round the corner out of sight of

the tenor, presented sufficient challenge to keep us amused even without the abundant and helpful reminders to "look to your left". After a good pub lunch at 'The George' and more handbell ringing in the sun, it was lovely to walk into Lambourn ringing room and see Steve Lowman beaming at us from a photo. These heavy old bells each presented their own challenges but our efforts were rewarded with their deep sonorous tones, which when played back on YouTube are the only bells I've found that don't send my cats running from the room!







All in all a delightful day, with a very happy ending for me at Brightwalton in the evening as I joined ringers from Preshute (Miri's next parish after North Leigh), Great Shefford and Brightwalton to celebrate the beginning of Miri's new ministry there.

Namiko is an associate professor at the Japanese Women's University in Tokyo, and has been in Oxford as an academic visitor to the School of Built Environment at Oxford Brookes University, interested in design and management of streets and living environment. Fukiné is her daughter, aged 14, and has been attending Cheney School.

They have both progressed well, have recently started ringing on Sundays, and were elected as members of the City Branch and of the Guild in February. They have rung at several other towers as well as St Giles - several times at practices at Headington - and many Branch members have probably met them. They also made a visit to Canterbury during the recent half-term, and were able to get a ring at the Cathedral practice.

Sadly, they will both be returning to Japan in late March, and we shall miss them. We wonder what impressions of English bellringing - and bellringers - they will pass on to their friends at home. We travelled to Headington in four cars and then found how difficult it was finding parking spots. We all got to the church in a reasonable time though and while Daphne prepared the ploughman's lunch and pizzas for us all, most of the young people played card games. Paul hadn't realised what had been planned and took his car load of young ringers up the tower and organised ringing on the simulator. He wondered why it took the rest of us so long

to park. We wondered where he and his car load were but of course couldn't hear the bells ringing!

Luckily we found Paul and the boys by the time lunch was ready and everyone enjoyed the spread that Daphne had provided. Paul organised us all for a group photo and also took some shots of the girls playing card games.

Whilst the ringing took place, the adults had to go and rescue their cars from two hour parking slots around Headington!
