Monday 31st March 2014 Spring Outing to Wiltshire - 22nd March 2014


On a day that offered a photographers' sky, we were fortunate enough to be visiting an artists' backdrop, all within five miles, south and west, of



the oft maligned urban sprawl of Swindon. A juxtaposition of classicism and modernity has probably never been so apparent during the course of an outing, although this is likely to increase in the coming years as villages fight to retain their rural integrity. After a winter of sustained rainfall and swollen aquifers the land has borne a riot of colour so vibrant as to lay down a challenge to the resolution of the most advanced Super HD equipment to convey its lustre. Those bringing paints, pastels and easels to capture the scene we encountered here may well have found it too glossy and gaudy to replicate, with daffodils, grass and sky bordering on the vividness of psychedelic colouration. Wootton Bassett exemplifies

several eras of this country's history, from its

sacking by the Vikings in the 11th century, through the industrial age ushered in by canal and railway, and most recently for the informal tributes paid during military repatriation processions which led to it





becoming only the third town in the country to receive Royal status in its name. Lyneham too played a central part in the processions, the RAF base being the starting point of the route which culminated,

and still does, at the John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford. The Lydiard villages are a vivid statement

of the manorial heritage of England's hinterland, Lydiard House having been the home of the St. John family, who were at their height of influence during Tudor times. The house and 300 acres of Lydiard Park are now administered by Swindon Borough Council, and are surrounded by a labyrinth of new housing and grid-pattern road system reminiscent of Milton Keynes. As would be expected the church in the park is richly

church exterior of the day, even to an untrained eye in architectural matters, was Purton, possessing as it does two towers, being one of only three such examples in the country. Having trawled through the archives of outings, I had to track back to the 1980s to find such a well-attended outing for this branch, and one can only praise the forbearance of the ringers given that the keenness to get on a rope is so much greater than in many a year.
