Mini Outing to Lane End and Turville on Saturday 31st May

Although we were in the heart of the Chilterns, the village of Lane End actually sits on a plain between the rolling hills and beech woods that are



the great characteristic of the region. More recently this area has garnered further recognition since the successful reintroduction of the red kite, an action which saw them quickly become a common sight for motorists on the M40, and now well beyond this territory. The parish church, with its saddleback roofed north tower, is a relatively recent building (Late 19th century), with its medieval roof timbers having been relocated from a large barn that once stood in the grounds of Bisham Abbey. By contrast to the Victorian 'dormitory-town' terraces and villas, just a few miles west is the scenic village of Turville, which is set amidst the glorious Hambleden Valley. Even if you are not aware of

the name of the village, the church, the windmill, the timber-framed cottages and the pub, overlooked

by hills and dense woodland on all sides, will surely have caught your eye from just having watched a modicum of films or television. For Turville read Dibley in the Vicar of Dibley, or Bramley End in Went the Day Well, or the windmill home of







Caractacus Potts in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, or Little Weirwold in Goodnight Mister Tom, or doubling as numerous Midsomer Murder country villages. It is fourteen years since we last visited these two towers on an outing and so these were new bells for most of our group, and this combined with the exquisite location bathed by a demure sun made for a signal morning. Despite being one of England's most scenic villages, thankfully from a ringers perspective, Turville remains relatively under the radar as a tourist hotspot, possessing as it does a lovely set of bells and an historic pub at which to round off our morning, The Bull and Butcher, whose name recalls the fatalistic marriage of Anne Boleyn (Bullen) and Henry VIII.
